# Help needed to advance our Visual Aid program

As chairman of the Visual Aid Committee and having visited a lot of Lodges, I have been proposing a new and advanced program. With this, and to the Lodges I have not been able to attend, I've been speaking on getting out to all the schools and promoting our Visual Aid program for children who need help with eye care.

In promoting the program, I've also asked to help extend our program in the future to help children who need more than just eyeglasses. The committee acknowledges, through the applications we have received, that we are making some good progress.

In our used eyeglass and case program, we've made great strides in getting the word out to the schools and public for collecting these items. The program proposed has been challenging individual Lodges to get out and get students or school classes involved in collecting these items. The class that turns in the most items will receive an ice cream and cake social around May 1 sponsored by their local Lodge. In order for this to happen, all eyeglasses and cases must be collected and turned in by April 1.

Also, a student who turns in 100 items will receive a \$50 savings bond from the Grand Lodge. Some Lodges also have volunteered to double this. These, you know, go to our state Visual Aid program for Third World Countries. Last year we passed out 700 pairs of glasses. This year we have 1,000 cases and our goal for next year is 1,500 cases.

These programs cost money. You have heard me ask for donations. Please be gracious, in your giving. The kids need this program and some of our seniors also need us.

Last year we had only 58 applications asking for help. Since April 1, 2003, we have paid out for 46 cases and have 59 cases pending. Our contributions have been keeping our funds solvent, but we need a lot more to be able to process all of the applications.

April 1 is a deadline for all of the materials needed for publication in our "Take Me" for our Grand Lodge Session.

Happy New Year, members:

The holiday season is over and wow, what a test for our waistlines! I hope all members took care and didn't add any inches to our already tight belt lines. During my travels around the state visiting the different Lodges, I noticed one glaring discrepancy. This is the protocol of introducing your visitors, whether it be visitors from different Lodges or appointed or elected Grand Officers. The Noble Grand should personally greet each visitor and note the names and titles of all those entitled to receive the *Honors of the Order* and those to be escorted and introduced during the meeting. A list of visitors with correct titles shall be given to the officers in charge of introductions.

All visiting Noble and Vice Grands, Grand Lodge committee members, plus other Lodge visitors can be called up by the Noble Grand and each visitor will announce themselves. They should be given a hearty welcome to the Lodge

### LINE UP OF OFFICERS FOR ESCORT

- 1. Past Elective Officers of other Units of the Order
- 2. Past Elective Officers of Grand Lodge and Rebekah Assembly
- 3. Elective Officers of other Units of the Order
- 4. Grand Representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge

  - 6. Elective International Officers
- 7. Grand Master or Rebekah Assembly President should be presented by himself/herself if on an official visit. At other times it is appropriate to introduce all together unless Jurisdictional Laws decree otherwise.

All officers escorted from the anteroom will proceed to the front of the Vice Grand's station and proceed to mid-point of the Lodge and turn left, just far enough that all officers can form a line for introduction.

The escorting officer, upon taking position, should say: "Noble Grand, it is with honor and a great deal of pleasure that I present to you the members here assembled (giving names and titles). Afterwards, all members shall respond with the proper Grand Honors.

At a public function (such as joint installations, etc.), committee members, Noble Grands and Vice Grands should not be introduced.

I welcome all new members being installed into the elected and appointed officers positions this month and wish for all Lodges to enjoy and have fun during the installation of these members. *Good luck*, *everyone!*

# An update on guidelines for Washington OddFellow reporters

We have printed these guidelines for reporters in *The Washington OddFellow* newspaper several times. As a result, many of your stories are now easier to read and put into type for the newspaper. However, several of you may have overlooked these guidelines. If you can, please keep these guidelines by your typewriter, computer or writing desk for future reference.

Again, here are a few suggestions which will make *The Washington OddFellow* a better newspaper for all of us:

- Be sure to include the name and number of your Lodge and the name of your town if the Lodge name is different. As a reporter, please include your name, too, so we can give you credit.
- If your story is handwritten, leave plenty of space between lines and please print any names so I can get them spelled correctly. Please double check all names. We have spent many hours researching membership rosters to make sure questionable names are spelled correctly and we have corrected the spelling on dozens of names. However, I am sure there are many more misspelled names that have slipped through.
- If your story is typed, please double space and *do not* type your entire story in all capital letters and do not use both sides of the paper. Please use *plain white typing paper*, not the onion skin type.
  - If you e-mail your story, please do not double space.
- Please include the names and pertinent information about deceased members on a *separate* piece of paper for the Memoriam column. Information should include the persons name, how long they have been a member and if they are a past presiding officer.
- Remember, *The Washington OddFellow* is received in your home and everyone else's on or about the first of the month. Keep this in mind when you are writing about events that will already have taken place by the time the newspaper is in your mailbox. Even if an event has not yet happened when you write your story, please word your story in the "past tense" if your event takes place before the newspaper comes out.
- Try to keep your stories as concise as possible. You have probably noticed that we have many more Lodges reporting now than we had in the past. Concise stories mean we can fit in news from more Lodges.
- Finally, when you are finished, read over your story to make sure everything is spelled correctly. Then, as a final measure, read the story out loud to yourself or to someone else. This is an easy way to tell if you have left out some important word or fact.
- Remember, our deadline is the 10th of each month for the next month's edition. The next deadline is February 10 for the March edition. You may mail your stories or fax them to: (360) 829-5339. You may e-mail your stories to: billo@tx3.com
