### From the Grand Musician

# This is why we sing

Before I became an Odd Fellow, my travails as a musician brought me in contact with many fraternal groups. I have played for gatherings of Eagles, Elks, Masons, Shriners, Lions, Rotarians, Sons of Italy, Sons of Norway and, of course, my own Brothers and Sisters in the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs. What I've found in all of those groups is that music plays an important role in fraternity and brotherhood.

In our own Lodges, music is codified in the rituals of opening, closing and several ceremonies like initiations. One may wonder why we choose to include music in our rituals. At the time that much of our modern ritual took form in the 19th century, music making was an important and central part of personal and civic life. Every town had its own band, many police and fire departments had bands or choruses, civic and social organizations had bands and orchestras and almost every home had a parlor piano or organ. It was part of a young person's proper training, in many instances, to receive piano lessons or some other form of musical instruction.

Coming from this era of pervasive music making, it's easy to see how music gained an important role in all kinds of public ceremonies and gatherings. Music, and specifically the act of singing together, was thought to be an important part of any gathering, especially something as important as fraternal lodge meetings. Even today this tradition continues: sporting events begin with the National Anthem, assemblies and meetings often begin with a patriotic or fun song, most church services include group singing of hymns, etc.

In this way, music gained a place in fraternal life because of its inclusion in many other areas of life. There is another reason, however for the inclusion of music in our rituals: just as our rituals remind us of the basic truths and beliefs of our Order, so does the act of singing our Odes bring us together in harmony and remind us of why we belong to this great and loving fraternity. When we unite our voices in song, we create the harmony we seek to propagate throughout humanity. This act helps to foster the ties of brotherhood and sisterhood which bind us together as a group. Singing also gives us a chance to take part in the ritual as a group; whereas most of the opening and closing consists of individual recitations and responses, the Odes give us the opportunity to participate as one large group — a living example of our bonds of fraternity.

The words of our Odes are a concise and eloquent statement about the values and principles of Odd Fellowship. From the Odd Fellows' opening Ode:

Join, Odd Fellowship of Brothers, In the song of truth and love; Leave disputes and strife to others, We in harmony must move.

These words remind us that when we're singing, we're joining in the "song of truth and love" and creating a sonic manifestation of two of the principles of Odd Fellowship. It also reminds us that, as Brothers, we cannot engage in any activities that would damage our brotherhood because we

### CONGRATULATIONS, NEW OFFICERS

I would like to remind all Lodges that the combination of Secretary and Financial Secretary is authorized. The combination of Financial Secretary with the office of Treasurer is not approved. It is very important that you have two financial officers and balance your books at the close of each regular meeting.

### SUPPLIES AND PUBLICATIONS

When the new Washington Digest was printed, the printer failed to print the Table of Contents. Those have now been mailed to all Lodges and officers entitled to receive them. However, if you received a Washington Digest with no Table of Contents (the last pages of the Digest), call this office and we will mail them to you.

New Rituals have been mailed to each Lodge. The Sovereign Grand Lodge now authorizes Four (4) copies. However, if you require additional copies, they are available.

must act in harmony. In the case of singing the Odes, we are literally acting in harmony.

Another passage from the opening Ode gives a further perspective on Odd Fellowship:

In our hearts enshrined and cherished,
May these feelings ever bloom —
Failing not when life has perished,
Living still beyond the tomb.

This section reminds us that the brotherly sentiments of Odd Fellowship should be undying. Caring for others is an important cornerstone of Odd Fellowship; we have all pledged to "visit the sick, relieve the distressed, bury the dead and educate the orphan." As we learned at our entry into this Order, these ministrations should continue throughout our lives and carry us into the next life as testimony to the good that we have done as Odd Fellows.

The closing Ode also reminds us of an important lesson:

Good night! and as you go,

Bear hence and fully show,

Stamped on your breasts,
The seal of friendship pure,
And love through life t'endure,
And truth, which still secure
With honor rests.

As Odd Fellows we must be proactive in living our beliefs. We must show to the world, through our deeds and actions, that we are Odd Fellows. Our daily lives should be examples of pure friendship, enduring love and secure truth so that these virtues are "stamped on our breasts" for all to see.

In many cases, declining membership in the recent past has meant that many Lodges are without trained musicians. While our Rebekah Sisters still count many pianists among their ranks, there are precious few Odd Fellows who are able to accompany the singing of these Odes. I would encourage those Lodges without a musician capable of accompanying the Odes to at least recite them as a group and take the opportunity to learn the lessons imparted therein or purchase a recording of the Odes, available from the Grand Secretary. Those of you who do have a musician and can sing the Odes should do so heartily and with joy! There are few greater ways of creating harmony than to gather together and raise everyone's voice in song. We should all use our Odes as a means to celebrate and reinforce the principles of our beloved Order.
