

REMEMBER, YOU ARE THE ASSEMBLY

Dear Sisters and Brothers:

At last we are having some bright and sunny days — a great and welcome change from the winter. Several of our Unit Officers are having their receptions in the near future. I hope you are able to support them by attending. These officers work very hard for their Units and for the entire Odd Fellow/Rebekah organization and deserve to be appreciated.



Is your Lodge taking care of their finances properly? It is important that the general rules be followed: a receipt for every warrant (exception for Lodge expenses of rent, allowances and donations, of course), a warrant for every check, (Secretary's and Noble Grand's signature on every warrant), two signatures on every check and, most of all, a bound record of these transactions and of

your income.

Your income must cover your expenses. You cannot spend Lodge funds for lunch or other personal expenses. The rule of thumb is: money raised in the name of Rebekahs can only be spent for Lodge and donation purposes. If you have saved money over the years and plan to give up your Charter, do not give your money away. When a Lodge closes, that does not mean the expenses of the organization as a whole changes. It means that the burden is increased for the remaining Sisters. These Sisters are your friends. None of us would deliberately cause hardship for our friends and that is what happens as Per Capita has to be increased.

I have heard members say, "The Assembly will get the money and they don't need it, they just spend it frivolously." This is not true. Look at the year-end reports in your "Take Me" and Journal and you will find that very little goes to the Officers' Expenses, the rest goes to the expenses of running the Assembly. Think of the work involved in managing this organization to keep it running smoothly and remember — *you* are the Assembly. That is my lecture for the day.

Assembly time is rapidly approaching and I hope a lot of you will be able to attend. As you know, starting this year, you do not have to be a Past Noble Grand to attend the meeting. This is your chance to come and see what happens, how legislation is passed, why reports are important, etc. We have fun, too, and have the pleasure of greeting our friends, some of whom we do not see too often. Mark your calendar June 21-23. Secretaries, be sure your Per Capita is sent in timely so your Representative can be recognized.

One of our Sisters mentioned the John Paulson article in the Odd Fellows newspaper and recommended our reading it very carefully. It was a very well written article. Thanks, John!


NG LouAnn read a story about "Loving Father."


