# PGM, PGP James Marshall passes away on October 6th



I think the guidelines for the newspaper says something like 600 words for officers so I am going to use the 1,200 or so words Dee and I are allowed.

I want to thank all of the District Deputies, Grand Lodge Officers and Past Grand Masters who showed up for our recent meeting in Buckley. If you did not make it you missed a really great meeting, Frank Wilson, Grand Warden, gave a great report on membership, followed by John Crispin, Deputy Grand Master, who gave a report on the goings on at SGL. After that Roger Bruland gave a report on the Visual Aid Committee that was quite informative. Each District Deputy who was in attendance also gave very informative reports on their Districts. And all of the attendees were forced to sit through a presentation by yours truly on Fisher House and the things they do. Thanks to Jodi Land, Manager of Fisher House at Fort Lewis, for the great DVD on their programs.

All of this was interrupted by a great lunch that was put on by "The Clique." They chose to give the proceeds of the lunch to Florence Frogge' and me for our projects. *Thank you Ladies!* These ladies are all Odd Fellow Sisters.

#### AN UPDATE ON DEE

First let's talk about my wife's present condition. This will not be easy for me, but it will dispel any rumors that have been started. I gave a report at the DDGM meeting in Buckley on October 7 and will tell you all the facts as they are.

On October 18 Dee suffered a seizure at 1:30 in the morning. I called 911 and started CPR until the paramedics arrived. She was taken to our local hospital where she had a second seizure in the emergency room. After being stabilized and admitted to the ICU unit she spent just over a week in the hospital, during which time we got the results of several tests that had been done in the preceding weeks. One of which was a PET scan and a needle biopsy of a mass in her abdominal area. These tests confirmed that her cancer has returned in a metastizied form. The day after her release from the hospital we went to see her cancer doctor and he told us that the tumor could not be operated on as it was entangled and due to location it was not a candidate for radiation treatment either. Colon cancer does not respond well to radiation treatment. He offered the hope of gaining some time by treating it with chemo. I asked him how long she had and his reply was one year to 18 months with treatment. I asked how long without treatment and he said three to six months. I told Dee that this was not a decision I could make for her. She told the doctor that she did not want any more chemo. He asked her if she understood what that meant and she replied, "It means I'm going to die."

I took her to a radiation oncologist that treated me for cancer. After having a lengthy talk with a cancer center in another city they suggested that I have her checked by my local radiation oncologist. Dr Regge told us she could treat the tumor and reduce it with about ten treatments, but it would come back in another location as it is loose in her body. She then left us to talk and after she returned Dee told her that she had made her decision a long time ago not to seek further treatment. Dr Regge asked her if she understood what that meant and she told her, "It means I am going to die."

I took Dee home and we were contacted by Hospice to see what they could do for us. At that time she was still receiving TPN nutritional treatment. She chose to discontinue that as it was causing some problems for her. She is still receiving dialysis three times a week and as long as she wants to go and can make the choice to go I will take her to the local kidney center for treatment. She expressed a choice to go to hospice to see if it was something she might want to do when it came time and after a week she decided that she wanted to stay, so that is where she is at this time.

I want to thank all of the individual members of both the Rebekahs and the Odd Fellows who have sent cards to us in support. I also want to thank all of the Odd Fellow and Rebekah Lodges and District Associations that have sent cards in support. Thank you all so much.

During this time I missed a few meetings and a reception for which I apologize.

Dee has requested that Marsha Presley, the Vice President of the



# **PGP Charles Bunce passes** away Oct. 9 in Kennewick



# An update on guidelines for **Washington OddFellow reporters**

We have printed these guidelines for reporters in *The* Washington OddFellow newspaper several times. As a result, many of your stories are now easier to read and put into type for the newspaper. However, several of you may have overlooked these guidelines. If you can, please keep these guidelines by your typewriter, computer or writing desk for future reference.

Again, here are a few suggestions which will make *The* Washington OddFellow a better newspaper for all of us:

- Be sure to include the name and number of your Lodge and the name of your town if the Lodge name is different. As a reporter, please include your name, too, so we can give you cred-
- If your story is handwritten, leave plenty of space between lines and please print any names so I can get them spelled correctly. Please double check all names. We have spent many hours researching membership rosters to make sure questionable names are spelled correctly and we have corrected the spelling on dozens of names. However, I am sure there are many more misspelled names that have slipped through.
- If your story is typed, please double space and *do not* type your entire story in all capital letters and *do not* use both sides of the paper. Please use *plain white typing paper*, not the onion skin type. If you are e-mailing, please single space your story.
- Please include the names and pertinent information about deceased members on a *separate* piece of paper for the Memoriam column. Information should include the persons name, how long they have been a member and what elected offices they have held, also in Grand Lodge and Assembly.
- Remember, *The Washington OddFellow* is received in your home and everyone else's on or about the first of the month. Keep this in mind when you are writing about events that will already have taken place by the time the newspaper is in your mailbox. Even if an event has not yet happened when you write your story, please word your story in the "past tense" if your event takes place before the newspaper comes out.
- Try to keep your stories as concise as possible. You have probably noticed that we have many more Lodges reporting now than we had in the past. Concise stories mean we can fit in news from more Lodges.
- Finally, when you are finished, read over your story to make sure everything is spelled correctly. Then, as a final measure, read the story out loud to yourself or to someone else. This is an easy way to tell if you have left out some important word or fact.

# Perfect volunteer!

# Ruth Berglund hasn't missed a day in 10 years as a Police Department volunteer - & she's 95!

The following story appeared in the Spokesman Review Valley Voice on September 7. It was written by Valerie Putnam.

At 95, Ruth Berglund doesn't know the meaning of the word "quit" "I saw too many people retire and just sit around," Berglund said. "Now they're gone. I just want to keep going."

Berglund spends about 50 hours a week volunteering with the Spokane Police Department. Twice a week she suits up in her police uniform and catches the bus to staff her shift at either the Spokane Courthouse or the STA Plaza At both places, she works in the information booth, directing visitors and answering questions. At the Plaza, Berglund also walks the grounds for exercise and looks for anything out of the ordinary.

She hasn't missed a day's work in 10 years, logging more than 4,700 hours.

"We're glad to have Ruth," said Gene LaLiberte, co-director of senior volunteers for Spokane Police Department "She is a pleasure. You can tell she loves what she does."

Born and raised on a cattle farm in Baggs, Wyoming, Berglund worked hard at a young age.

"I was the second boy in our family for many years," Berglund remembers with a laugh. "When my parents needed extra help I would go out"

She would rise at 6 a.m. and work until she went to bed around 9 p.m. Leading a stacker horse at age 5 is one of her earliest memories.

"Old Maude knew more about it than I did," Berglund recalls. "I held onto the rope. When she got to the right place, she would stop and I would pull the rope."

Berglund met her husband, Clarence, at a country dance in 1929. A year later, they married and started their own farm. A severe drought in 1934 forced them to leave and move to Washington state.

"We planned on only visiting Clarence's sister in Spokane," Berglund said. "But we wound up living here."

Together they raised three children. Berglund was a stay-at-home mom until her son, Joe, became ill with polio and narcolepsy. His medical bills forced her to take a job at Miller, Moler and Flynn, a small downtown dry goods store.

She later worked at Montgomery Ward and in the payroll office at

Sacred Heart Medical Center. After leaving Sacred Heart, she worked out of her own home as Secretary for the Rebekah Assembly of Washington.

"As secretary I got to travel all over Washington and Alaska," Berglund said. "I made a lot of good friends."

In 1965, she became a secretary for Spokane School District. She

worked there until she retired.

"At that time they forced you to retire at 65," Berglund said. "Otherwise I would have continued to work."


Clarence died in 1990. After his death, Berglund cared for an ill neighbor until her death in 1996. Restless, Berglund turned to volunteering to keep herself active.

"I'm not one to sit and watch TV," said Berglund. "Some of my friends volunteer and I liked the sound of that."

She also volunteers at the South Hill COP shop and KSPS-TV.

"She is very energetic," KSPS's Executive Director Patty Starkey said. "She's an inspiration to us."

Living in the same home



"I do everything to take care of them," Berglund said.

Walking is an important part of Berglund's routine. In 1980, she could walk four miles in an hour. Today she walks three or four times a week, an average of two miles a day.

She also enjoys reading, crocheting, knitting and making dolls out of plastic canvas.

"I hope to work until I drop," Berglund said. "I really mean that."
