On Monday night at the All-Branch Banquet, we will have Jodi Land and her daughter in attendance. Jodi is the manager of Fisher House at Fort Lewis. Her husband is currently deployed to Iraq with one of the Stryker brigades. We may also have some other guests who are not members of our Order, so this would be a good time to display what we are about and put a positive light on our members and the things we do for mankind.

I would like to share with you a letter that was sent to the Grand Lodge office from one of the family members of a patient at Fisher House. I will reprint it here so you can see how important this program is to the families that use it.

"I moved into the Fisher House on April 6, 2007 after spending a week in the hospital where my son had been diagnosed with leukemia six days earlier. Our residence is Alaska and moving into the Fisher House has been a life saver. It has been like a home away from home for me and my husband, and son after he was released from the hospital. The Fisher House is run like a normal large household and this has helped with the feelings of alienation from being away from home and enjoying your privacy and feeling like I have a place of my own. The Fisher House staff has been great helping me meet the sometimes demanding needs of my son's continuing care. I am not sure how long we will be staying, but I'm so thankful for the Fisher House and the caring they show for each family."

I think you can see from this letter how important this program is. We have all been through periods of stress from similar situations. Think about how much worse this could be for this family and how much better it was made by the Fisher House being there for their use and the care and support they received from the staff and each other.

I want to thank all of the lodges and individual members that have contributed to this project. We will be giving out some certificates of appreciation to the lodges at the banquet on Monday night, as well as some other things from Fisher House.

I want to offer a special thank you to Sister Karen Hoylman, PP, for asking me to allow her granddaughter Florence to walk with me during the wreath laying ceremonies at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery. It was my privilege to have her escort me. If you have not sat and talked to this young lady, you should. She is wise beyond her years and very perceptive. She will go far in whatever she chooses to do with her life and career. Thank you, Florence. I think Dee would have been very proud to have you there with us if she were still here with us.

In a few short weeks we will convene Grand Lodge. I urge each and every member who can attend to come and see what goes on at Grand Lodge so you will have a better understanding of what takes place and how it may affect your lodge. I understand that some of the Lodge Representatives have said that they will not be coming because their lodge would not give them money to attend. Brothers, I urge you to reconsider that decision. The report of sick found Tony Tamburello, Helen Manowski, Mary Curtiss, Florine Roehl, Janie Kuja and Ethel Swanson not well.


