HOLD YOUR HEADS UP HIGH AND CONTINUE

I hope everyone had a happy Easter and I hope you are all having sunny days after the rough winter we had. The daffodils are blooming and it looks like it is going to be a lovely summer. Enjoy the sun.

As this year has passed I have had the confidence of so many of you sharing with me the personal tragedies in your lives. I cannot tell you how my heart goes out to you and how proud I am of you being able to hold

your head up high and continue with your lives. Thank you for sharing with me, as your friend, your heartbreaks during this time. Remember, I am always here for you if you need someone to talk to.

A reminder to all who have reports to turn in to be published in the "Take Me." While I know some of you must wait until the last meeting of your group, which would

probably be in March, it is urgent that you get these reports in no later than April 6 if they are to be published and mailed out before Assembly. By the time you get this newspaper, it will probably be too late, but I hope you remembered. The "Take Me" will be worked on this month with the Printing Committee meeting to review it the last weekend in April so it can be printed and sent to you in May. When you do get the "Take Me," Secretaries, please read all the legislation and the budget at your lodge meeting. This affects your lodge and your Representative will be voting on this at Assembly.

Which brings up another subject on reports. This is the first year there have been several Annual Reports very late. I urge you, next year, immediately after your last meeting in December to sit down and make out your Annual Report. An extra special thank you to those who did this. If someone who needs to sign the Annual Report is out of town, on vacation, ill or whatever, call and find out what procedure to follow. If you have difficulty in understanding how to do the report call this office and the Secretary will assist you. It is imperative that these reports be in early so this office can complete the SGL billing and get the SGL Report and dues to Sovereign on time. Your help is really needed on this and deeply appreciated.

Even though many of us have been Rebekahs for some time, we occasionally need to be reminded of some basic directions which apply to all. One is Parliamentary Procedure for Presiding Officers. Parliamentary Law originated in England and came to America with the early settlers. Henry M. Robert published his manual on Parliamentary Law in 1876 and the rules remain the same today with up-dating to fit our time. Primarily this means: One thing at a time; courtesy to all; justice and equality to all; the will of the majority and the right of the minority to be heard. It can be adapted to fit the needs of your Rebekah Lodge. Every new Noble Grand should have a copy of Parliamentary Procedure for Presiding Officers and pass it on to the incoming Noble Grand. We all need to be reminded sometimes on how to run an enjoyable and interesting meeting.

The second thing we need to consider is Protocol and Customs for Rebekah Lodges. This includes introduction of visitors, correct order, etc. This has changed somewhat over the years, but the President, on her official visit, is introduced last and by herself unless certain other dignitaries are also present (lodge preference, of course). This is listed under Protocol and Customs for Rebekah Lodges.

I have sent for new copies of the above and will be happy to supply them to you if requested, but please help us out and pay the postage. It is greatly appreciated.

On the matter of your report to the IRS. *This is required of all lodges*, regardless of income. You go to IRS E-Postcard on the web and, using your annual report, fill in the answers. However, as usual, there has been a flaw in the operation. You cannot file this until after March 31st as the IRS has the Lodges Fiscal Year ending on that date, the same as the Assembly and Grand Lodge. The SGL Secretary advises that we have until May to file, so just wait until after March 31 and fill it out. If you don't have a computer or want help, please call me.

I hope this column has been helpful to you. Sit back, think good thoughts and you know the routine by now — count your blessings.

A sense of community


"It is in the shelter of each other that the people live."
