WE WILL GROW IF WE INVEST

Brothers and Sisters, this past month I have reviewed the Annual Reports of the Grand Lodge and Rebekah Assembly. The section of the report dealing with membership, as you might guess, is very concerning and frankly

In the Grand Lodge, we have reported a decline across the state of eight members, less than one percent. You might be tempted to look at this figure and think, "Hey that's not bad." But even a slight decline is not growth and in this world you are either growing or dying. We also have a few lodges that are just hanging in there so that despite this apparent reduction in decline our future is still at risk.

The Rebekah Assembly has reported a loss of 197 members and six lodges. These figures speak for themselves.

This year two of our lodges had anniversaries: Yakima 125 years and Pasco 100 years. In the four years between the institutions of Pasco and Des Moines, we instituted 40 Odd Fellow Lodges — more than ten a year — and I would assume a like number of Rebekah Lodges. At Pasco's institution there were 120 Odd Fellow Brothers visiting for this event from all over this state and other states.

It is often dangerous to dwell on the glory days of the past; but, Brothers and Sisters, why the difference? In years past we provided something of value for our members and our communities. Each lodge was able to choose programs and needs that served their communities providing meeting places and social networks, helping the less fortunate, banking services and exercise clubs. We chose to be what our communities needed and we still can.

What is it that you value about your membership in the Order? What drives you to attend meetings? What would spur you to invite family, friends, and co-workers to meetings? We participate in activities and organizations that we value and value those we participate in. We have a number of lodges in the state that are bucking the declining trend and growing. They have renewed interest in our rituals, are renovating their halls, hosting charity dinners, concerts, and sponsoring youth sports from soccer teams to race cars. The members of these lodges value the work they do in lodge and make time for it. If you love something you need to support it and that support can come in many different forms: time, money and effort. To paraphrase President Kennedy, ask not what your lodge can do for you, but what you and your lodge can do for your community. Look for the activities that inspire you to attend and invest in your lodge.

What encourages you to include your family, friends and others that you value and admire, find those characteristics that make lodge one of the first things you think of when you wake in the morning.



A sad day in Ione

Pine Forest Rebekah Lodge #271 dissolves

Odd Fellowship goes back to 1855 when Washington was a territory, with the institution of Olympia Lodge IOOF Lodge #1.

The first Ione IOOF Lodge #285 was started in Colville on November 30, 1910. On March 13, 1915 a new Odd Fellows Lodge was instituted and organized in Ione. Fifty Odd Fellow and Rebekah members were listed on the Charter on that date. The Rebekahs continued to carry out the mission of service to the local community, state and national projects ever since that time.

The Rebekah Lodge was named Pine Forest #271. An article written in the *Ione Gazette* dated April 21, 1949 reads: Box Canyon (the men's) Lodge #337 was instituted with 34 members on April 9, 1949 and by the end of the year they had 41 members. Following a free ham dinner was served to 140 Odd Fellows and Rebekahs at the schoolhouse by Pine Forest Rebekahs.

The lodge members held their twice-monthly meetings for several years on the second floor of the old two-story Ione Peaceful Valley Grange Hall, which was located on the southwest end of Main Street (site of the present day Grange Hall) while their new building was being constructed. A lot and a half was purchased on the northeast corner of Main and Central Avenues in 1949 for \$500, with \$100.00 down and payments of \$25 a month. Basement construction began in 1968 on a 44' by 80' with sand pumice blocks, which at one point caved in causing a setback. The lodge room itself is 44' by 32', housing a dining hall, large kitchen and six locker spaces. The rooms were furnished with cedar and spruce paneling from the Ione Lumber Company mill. The building was constructed by volunteer labor. Lodge members, business organizations and townspeople had donated materials and furnishings. Employees of the Ione Lumber Co., who were on seasonal shut down, did the finishing work and painting. The top part of the lodge hall was completed a few years later. Miss Betty Thompson, then the manager of the Ione State Bank, donated monies for the hall to be carpeted, and the Ione Theater (which is now the Baptist Church) gave the lodge their old plush theater seats.

Every Easter the Odd Fellow Lodge men would boil and dye dozens and dozens of eggs to hide in the Ione city park for the youngsters on Easter morning.

The men's Box Canyon Lodge surrendered their Charter a few short years ago, leaving the Rebekahs to carry on the work. In 1982, the (Metaline's) Mount Linton Rebekah Lodge and then (Newport's) Woodbine Rebekah Lodge in the 1990s consolidated with Pine Forest. At one time there were nine Rebekah Lodges in District #16. They always met the last Saturday in April. Those lodges were: Mt.Linton, (Metaline's), Ione, Newport, Kettle Falls, Colville, Chewelah, Hunters, Rice and Cedonia. By 1984, there were six lodges and in 2006, three were left.

The Ione Rebekahs were involved in many projects. Bingo was held every Saturday night since 1959. The United Nations Pilgrimage contests were started by Rebekah Lodges throughout the United States and Canada. In 1961 and every other year since, a Selkirk High School student was chosen to send to the United Nations. Some years two students were sent. The Rebekahs participated in the annual Down River Days parades, and operated the hamburger stand all weekend in the city park. The ladies took train reservations for the Lions Train Rides. For several years in October they prepared Octoberfest dinners. For 40 some odd years the annual Ione Bazaar was held every first Saturday in December. Throughout the years, the Rebekah ladies prepared many dinners for weddings and funerals. The ladies decorated Yule Logs to sell and baked up to 40 gingerbread houses during the Christmas holidays. They also decorated, packed and delivered up to 80 Christmas boxes for people at Christmastime.

With declining membership and rising costs, we sadly announce that our lodge is closing for good. Pine Forest Rebekah Lodge #271 members say "thank you" to everyone in the communities who have supported and helped us so much all these many many years.
