
THANK YOU FOR YOUR THOUGHTFULNESS

As you know this is my last column as Secretary of the Rebekah Assembly of Washington. It has been my sincere hope to serve you well and I sincerely hope I have fulfilled that obligation.

CLEARING UP RUMORS

I had hoped, also, that my last column would be short and sweet, but something has come up that I think needs to be addressed and it is concerning rumors. You who really know me know that I will not shirk



Recently a false rumor was called to my attention regarding what happens to a lodge's belongings when a lodge gives up its Charter. This is what happens: The Assembly asks for the Charter, Register, Minutes, Charge Books, Rituals, Code of General Laws, Rebekah Flag and Financial Statements. The lodge is encouraged to give things like kitchen items, linens, robes, etc. to other lodges or organizations as there is no place in the Assembly office to store these things. Some things are turned in to be given to the Home, which they are.

When the papers are received, a folder is made for the lodge, which includes the inventory, membership, etc. and placed in a permanent file. The register, minute books and Charter are taken to the State Historical Society in Tacoma. Information from the register and minute books is put on file there for research purposes. The Charter is stored and can be reclaimed at any time. The man in charge of this section of the museum is Ed Nolan and his phone number is (253) 798-5917 should anyone wish to check on this. This information could have easily been obtained by a phone call to this office and, I hope, should anything like this come up about anyone in this organization, on anything that affects them personally, that you, as a Sister or Brother, would follow the concepts of our Order and check it out, not just go along with the flow and repeat harmful things that are not true.
