Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We are happy to announce our 2019 Sessions, beginning with the Theta Rho Pool Party on Friday, June 21 and ending with the Encampment/LEA Sessions and Dinner Installation on Wednesday, June 26. This year will mark our 141st Grand Lodge Communication and our Order's Bicentennial.

The location for the Grand Lodge's 141th Session will remain in Yakima at the Red Lion Hotel Yakima Center. The cost of rooms is the same as last year: \$77 for a single or double, \$87 for triple and lastly \$97 for a quad. Your stay also includes breakfast with the price of your room for each day. Please give the hotel an accurate count of how many will be in the room at time of reservation. *Only* the number listed per room will be allowed to eat breakfast as part of their stay. All others will have to pay.

From the desk of your Grand Master

ODD FELLOW BICENTENNIAL

When I was first elected Grand Warden three years ago it never occurred to me that I would be leading this



jurisdiction during our bicentennial. It is with a great deal of pride that I am serving as your Grand Master as we celebrate this auspicious occasion.

Odd Fellowship predates the founding of the IOOF in Baltimore in 1819. Its roots are firmly planted within the guild system of English history. From the Middle Ages onward, it became common for tradesmen to band together for the protection of their craft and the mutual aid of their colleagues. Many of these craft guilds have grown into modern fraternal orders bedecked

TOBY HANSON with contemporary prestige. But what was there for the simple street sweeper? The butcher? The handyman? Or the coach spring maker?

None of those trades were large or important enough to have its own guild. As a result, the fellows of these odd and assorted trades banded together across the lines of their professions to form a society for mutual aid. At meetings they would pass the axe and collect funds for the relief of members who had fallen upon hard times. From this simple tradition of mutual aid came one of the largest, noblest, and most respected of organizations.

LOOKING FOR COMPANIONSHIP

When Thomas Wildey came to Baltimore in the early 19th Century he was looking for both the companionship and the support he missed from his lodge at home in England. Though not remembered as an academic, Wildey possessed a zeal for organizing and a passion for spreading the message of Odd Fellowship. Motivated by a boundless interest in helping those in distress, he built Odd Fellowship into a major component of civilized society in North America. By the time of his passing in 1861, he had started 155 lodges in 14 states with more than 11,000 members. Wildey's impressive feat was aided immeasurably by Sovereign Grand Secretary Thomas Ridgley.

THE HEYDAY OF ODD FELLOWSHIP

By our centennial in 1919, we were the world's largest fraternal order with 1.7 million members. In this jurisdiction there were about 300 lodges covering every corner of the state from Forks to Asotin and from Ilwaco to Ione. There was a lodge within riding distance of every farmer, logger, fisherman, train conductor, mailman, clerk, and porter in the state. At that time, Unique Encampment #32 of Spokane was the largest Encampment in all of Odd Fellowship with more than

1,000 members. Our Order was at its peak and would remain there into the 1950s.

BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

Since that time, we have experienced a precipitous decline in membership. Where once there was a lodge in every town and several in our larger cities, now there are several counties without a single lodge. We can fret about the causes of this decline, but that won't do much to reverse it. Besides, what's important now is not picking apart the past, but building for the future. Its easy to be despondent about what we have lost — about how Odd Fellowship has gone from a central institution in civic life to a peripheral one at best — but there is nothing gained in that pursuit.

MUTUAL AID NEVER GOES OUT OF STYLE

The central appeal of Odd Fellowship — mutual aid and assistance — retains its timeless appeal. Wherever there are people working for a living there will be a desire for them to gather together for fraternity. A new generation of people are discovering this timeless appeal of Odd Fellowship and joining our Order. It's happening across the world in places like the Philippines and Europe and even right here in Washington as we're saving lodges like Prosperity #301 in Wenatchee. Even our friends in the Grand United Order of Odd Fellows are seeing growth as they just chartered new lodges in Syracuse and Atlanta.

WE'RE STRONG AND VITAL

We may no longer enjoy the prominence we once did, but Odd Fellowship is still strong and vital. We can all take a sense of pride in our Order as we look toward the future with hope and optimism. We have a collection of wonderful lodges in this jurisdiction which are active, engaging places to be a member. With such a firm foundation there's no reason why we can't grow in the 21st Century like we did in the 19th and early 20th Centuries. Here's hoping the tricentennial finds my successor a hundred years hence writing a letter to his Brothers and Sisters outlining the triumphs of Odd Fellowship's next century.



CELEBRATING 200 YEARS

Dear Dear Sisters and Brothers,

As you all know Friday, April 26 is the 200th Anniversary of our Order. The founder of Odd Fellowship was Thomas Wildey. He was an Odd Fellow

in England and when he traveled to the United States he missed the companionship of the brotherhood. He put an advertisement in the newspaper to determine if there was an interest. Four other men responded and met at the Seven Stars Inn in Baltimore where they began the process of forming the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in North America.

The lodge was formed. They instituted as Washington Odd Fellow

Lodge #1, dedicating the Order to achieve philanthropic goals of visit the sick, relieve the distressed, bury the dead, and educate the orphan.

Wildey traveled widely to set up lodges and at the time of death in 1861 there were more than 200,000 members of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in 42 states.

Also Friday, April 26 is Arbor Day and what a perfect time to plant a tree and be a part of the "Living Legacy Program." This program was the idea of Sovereign Grand Master Wilson D. Berkey, who in 1989 noticed many dead trees in the jurisdiction that he was visiting — which caused great concern. He commissioned this worthy project as a program of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. Planting trees makes a difference in our environment, beautifies our communities, and provides cover and food for wildlife. Invite the local media to your tree planting event. It is a great publicity opportunity. More than six million trees have been planted by the combined branches of our Order.

Past President Betty Weldon passes at 95

Betty Bell Weldon, Past President of the Rebekah Assembly of Washington and Past Assembly Secretary, passed away at 1 a.m. on February 25, 2019 at the age of 95. Sister Betty was living with her two daughters, Ellen Jackson and Georgia Cain, in Ava, Missouri. Betty was born on January 17, 1924.

Betty was initiated into Auora Rebekah Lodge #246 in California on May 3, 1961 and transferred to Longview Rebekah Lodge #305 on April 10, 1984. Betty served as Noble Grand numerous times and was their Recording Secretary and Treasurer for a number of years. Sister Betty served as Washington's Rebekah Assembly President at the 104th Annual Sessions held in Spokane in June of 1996.

LIVING ON THE FARM

In Missouri, she lived on a farm, "Sisters Heritage Farms," where they raised numerous animals including chickens and cows.

Betty previously lived in California and worked as a crane operator in the ship yards in Oakland during World War II. She was considered one of the first "Rosie the Riveters." Betty met George Weldon when his ship returned to San Francisco. They met, had a whirlwind romance that proved to be love at first sight, and were married three days later on November 24, 1942. George passed away on July 4, 2006.

After WW II, Betty returned to school and earned a degree in education. She was a reading specialist and worked as a school superintendent, taught in junior colleges, the Maritime Academy, and the prison system in numerous locations in California. Betty also taught and tutored English to children in Mexico and when into the fields to teach the migrant workers, how to read and write, so they could teach their children. She created internet articles about DIY and other projects on different websites until shortly before she passed away.

ASSEMBLY PRESIDENT

When she served as Assembly President, her theme was "Count Your Blessings;" her emblem was the Blue Bird; her fun emblem was a lamb; her flower was the rose; her colors were blue, white and silver; her motto was "I'd sooner wear out than rust out" and "The best helping hand you will ever find is at the end of your right arm." Her aims were to help the lodges develop a strategy to build on what we have; what do we have to work with?; and don't say my cup is half empty, but half full. Her scripture was Galatians 6:10; her songs were "It's a Small, Small World and "Pennies From Heaven; her prayer was the Rebekah Lodge Opening Prayer; her project was to enclose a balcony at the Home in Walla Walla so the residents of one of the buildings could come out during bad weather; her personal project was to have

the lodges collect pennies during the year to sponsor a student or students on the Pilgrimage for Youth.

Sister Betty received the Decoration of Chivalry on

May 10, 1990 and in 2000 she was elected Assembly Secretary. She retired as Secretary at the Sessions in 2009, where she was awarded the title of Secretary Emeritus and received the Assembly Meritorious Award at that Session.

Sister Betty married early in life and had a son, David, who she lost when he was only 10 months old. She was blessed with three daughters; Ellen Jackson, Georgia Cain and Susan McCabe, 8 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren; and 1 great-great-grandchild which is due in September.



The Sovereign Grand Lodge Code of General Laws doesn't indicate what months or if they are to be consecutive, but it does say the following:

CHAPTER V - ODD FELLOWS LODGES

INDEPENDENT ORDER OF ODD FELLOWS
UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF A GRAND BODY
B, (1), C

SEC. 7. TERMS, MEETINGS, AND QUORUM

- A The term of the Lodge: (if it meets weekly, may be six months, unless an annual term is adopted. Annual terms begin with the first meeting day in January and semi-annual terms shall begin with the first meeting days in January and July or as specified in the Unit's By-Laws.)
- Regular: The meetings of all Lodges shall be held weekly, bi-weekly or semi-monthly. Terms shall annual, except those Lodges meeting weekly may have six (6) month terms. Local Units shall meet at the hour on the day specified in the Unit's By-Laws.
 - (1) Meetings
 - (a) One meeting could be conducted as a social/informal type meeting if the Grand Body so provides.
 - (b) Regular meetings falling on legal holidays may be omitted.
 - (c) A Grand Body may grant a dispensation to a Local Unit enabling the Local Unit to dispense with meetings for a period not to exceed two months in a calendar year.

Pathologist to speak at our meeting last month. Eileen Blute serves residents from Assisted Living to the Skilled Nursing Center. Blute said most people don't know all the communication disorders pathologists are able to treat.

She assists in four main areas: Language, Speech Deficits, Cognition and Difficulty Swallowing.

Language – Dysarthria is slurred or mumbled speech. Treatment focuses on getting the person to slow down and change their breathing.


Speech Deficits - Dyspnea or shortness of breath. The patient feels out of breath when talking or walking. Improvement can come with breathing exercises or supplemental oxygen.

Cognition – Memory Loss requires strategies to give the person confidence, such as naming pictures, allowing for yes or no answers and participating in social groups.

Difficulty Swallowing – The individual might get tired of chewing, or cough on fruit juice or coffee. The speech pathologist would moderate the diet and incorporate it into safe foods to eat.


