
EVEN NUMBERED LODGES





Activity Director cultivates indoor gardens

Maria Muñoz, Activity Director at the Washington Odd Fellows Home in Walla Walla, was on the team that brought "Eldergrow" to the Home in January 2020. The raised garden beds are mobile and can be moved around the care centers. "The idea of a mobile, wheelchairheight, indoor garden is amazing and so beneficial," said Muñoz.

It seems many seniors miss their gardens. "I've heard this issue so many times when they leave their home and move into a residential community," said founder Orla Concannon who lives in Seattle. "We want to bring the outdoors in for everyone to easily enjoy."

Research shows the positive effects of horticultural therapy: It connects residents to nature, elevates mood, stimulates the senses and memory, improves sleep, reduces falls and agitation, and keeps hands nimble and strong, according to the WSU Extension Master Gardener Program.

THERAPEUTIC SENSORY GARDEN

Eldergrow has two indoor mobile gardens with a combination of the therapeutic sensory garden and a culinary herb garden. Both have a grow light, non-toxic plants, and organic soil.

"Twice a month local educators go on-site and deliver therapeutic programs specially tailored to memory-care residents," said Julianne Mobilion in "A Passion for Serving Elders," November 11, 2019.

Concannon has her Eldergrow headquarters in Seattle. She launched the program to bring seniors indoors during inclement weather and build meaningful relationships with others through nature.

"Many thanks to Eldergrow for their interest in helping our memory-care residents," said Patty Newell, Narcissa Rebekah Lodge #2 Noble Grand.

CULINARY HERB GARDEN

The culinary herb garden is designed as a "Do It Yourself" garden. "Every month we ship fresh herbs and provide activities and recipes for communities to use with that delivery," Concannon said. The herb program is ideal for other units in the retirement community, such as independent living or assisted living residents.

Currently, there are almost 200 mobile gardens across 21 states. "In addition, 85 per cent of those residents improved or maintained a positive emotional state," Concannon said. "And 90 percent of residents experienced therapeutic results of memory stimulation, reduced dementia risk factors by 36 per cent, improved self-esteem and sleep, calm demeanors, and reduced cognitive decline in those with dementia."

She earned a Bachelor's Degree in Business Management. Prior to coming to the Washington Odd Fellows Home, Muñoz was a wireless retail manager for several years in customer service and management. "I truly enjoy the Odd Fellows family," she said. "I like to combine my passion for management with my creativity in planning events and bringing smiles to people's faces."

Muñoz has three sons ages nine, eight, and three, which keep her busy outside her job with their various sports. She is athletic herself and has joined the Walla Walla Sweets Rollergirls. In her spare time, Muñoz enjoys life with family and friends, music, gym, traveling, the outdoors, and making memories with her children.

This month we are making Valentines for our adopted care center. They are so appreciative of what we do for






How about 11 Theta Rho Girls and three Advisors spending a rainy weekend all together in a cozy cabin at Scott Lake near Olympia?

Did you know? Here's the procedure for transferring of members

So, there seems to be confusion on how a transfer works in our great Order. There are several steps that need to be done. Below you will find the steps for transferring a member.

This is directly from the Sovereign Grand Lodge of General Laws:

CHAPTER XXVII CARDS AND CERTIFICATES

SECTION 1. GENERAL C. Transfer Certificates.

- (1) **PROCEDURE**. Lodge as used herein means any component unit of the Order. A member may transfer from one (1) lodge to another as follows:
- (a) If not under charges and dues are paid ninety (90) days in advance.
 - **(b)** Signs petition for membership (application) in lodge to which the member wishes to transfer and attaches official certificate and fee as determined by the Grand Lodge (this jurisdiction \$1).
 - (c) Lodge receiving petition investigates and ballots (same as you do an application for membership by initiation). Returns fee, petition, and certificate if not elected. If elected, secretary of new lodge notifies secretary of old lodge sending the fee and requesting a transfer certificate. (Certificates can be purchased from the Grand Lodge for \$1)

- (d) Secretary of old lodge sends transfer certificate to secretary of new lodge properly signed and sealed, without action of the lodge.
- (e) When the secretary of the new lodge receives the certificate, notification will be sent to the member to attend and complete transfer by signing members' register, which terminates membership in old lodge.
- (f) Secretary of new lodge shall immediately fill out, detach, and mail the certification from the transfer certificate to secretary of old lodge who shall then refund to the new lodge any dues paid in advance of date shown.
- (g) If member fails to sign members' register of new lodge within ninety (90) days the certificate is void and membership continues in old lodge.
- **(h)** Lodges paying sick or funeral benefits may charge an admission fee.
- (i) Members may transfer as beneficial or non-beneficial, but the right to benefits in the new lodge is governed by its by-laws.
- (j) Transfers between lodges of Independent Jurisdictions and lodges under direct supervision of The Sovereign Grand Lodge or other Grand Bodies shall be governed by the preceding sections.

There you have it! It's long winded but really easy to accomplish.
