
Grand Sessions 2020

I survived COVID-19 Grand Secretary continued to work from home

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In these times of uncertainty with this terrible virus running around, I wanted to tell you that there is some good news. I survived the virus! Yes!

I came down with flu-like symptoms, a little cough, fever, terrible headache, body aches, etc. I wasn't feeling good Friday, April 9. I had no temperature, went to bed and had chills all night along with a terrible headache. I woke up in the morning and my temperature started to rise. Once it hit 101, I headed over to St. Elizabeth's Hospital emergency room in Enumclaw. I got to have the swab test.

When they say it makes a grown man cry, they aren't kidding! You have this swab stuck up your nose to the back of your sinuses and rolled around for about ten seconds. And you don't get it once up each nostril, but twice. Yeah, it's no fun!

Once that's was done, I received instructions to self medicate (DayQuil, NyQuill, and drink plenty of fluids so you do not become dehydrated). I was instructed to self isolate (me in the bedroom, Dave in the back bedroom, mom to her room and the front room). If my cough became worse or if I were to have a hard time breathing. I was to head back to the hospital.

I received the call on Easter Sunday that my test came back positive for COVID-19. The first thing I did was notify my assistants and then had the office decontaminated. But I am strong, in good health and by Monday I was feeling just fine.

I did receive a call from the Health Dept asking if I had been in contact with anyone that had the virus, if I had been outside of the US, if we were self isolating, etc. They released me from isolation on Friday, April 17.

I want you to know, that I had limited myself to travel to the office periodically and to a grocery store. I practiced mask wearing, gloves, sanitizing everything and double extra hand washing. I still managed to get it

So please continue to practice social distancing, wear your masks, gloves and wash your hands. We will get through this together.


ENCAMPMENT NEWS





A LOOK INTO WALLA WALLA'S PAST



Enterprise Lodge #2 was instituted in Walla Walla on February 2, 1863. After two wooden lodges burned downtown, Enterprise shared a building with the Masons out of town in Robert's Grove. In 1870, Brother J. F. Abbott set up a lodge room on the second floor of Cayuse Stable (inset photo) on Alder Street. As one Brother said, "This Lodge Hall wasn't as bad as it looked — though it was known as the Pigeon Loft." The lodge invested wisely and accumulated funds to finance the comfortably furnished Temple of Enterprise Lodge (large photo) that was built in 1880 on the corner of Main and Fifth Streets. Many historic events took place here. Washington

Lodge #19, Trinity #121, Narcissa Rebekah Lodge #2, Bee Hive Rebekah Lodge #70, and the Grand Encampment were instituted in 1884.

1918 Pandemic vs COVID-19 There are many differences and similarities

BY SHIRLEY RUBLE

Are there any similarities between the 1918 influenza pandemic and the 2019-2020 coronavirus? Yes. Stay-athome orders were issued for both pandemics. Healthcare supplies, hospitals, and healthcare workers were in short supply.

Are there any major differences between the two viruses? Yes. There were no ventilators in 1918. America was involved in World War I. The influenza hit 20 to 40-year-olds the hardest, and the coronavirus has struck those over 65 the most.

The 1918 flu, which was known as the Spanish flu, didn't actually originate in Spain. The name caught on because Spain recorded the deaths while other nations censored the information.

ORIGINS

How did the deadly influenza reach America in 1918-1919? It originated when 18 soldiers returned to Haskell County, Kansas as World War I ended on November 11, 1918. While serving in Europe as many as 53,500

Americans died of influenza. About 500 million became infected with the virus, and 50 million died worldwide, as stated in "1918 Pandemic," Centers for Disease Control, March 21, 2018.

The coronavirus was first seen in Wuhan Province, China on December 30, 2019. It was identified as a pandemic on March 11 when more than 849,000 cases of COVID-19 were reported by the World Health Organization in over 200 countries. There were 41,600 deaths and more than 176,000 recoveries. There is no vaccine as yet, according to Holly Secon, Science Fellow, Business Insider, April 2, 2020, New York, N.Y.

1918 INFLUENZA

The first cases in Washington State occurred on September 17, 1918 as troops returned to the Bremerton

Naval Yard. In a few days there were 163 known cases. By early October, all schools and public gatherings were closed across the state.

SPANISH FLU COMES TO WALLA WALLA

The dreaded pandemic struck Walla Walla in 1919. There were 112 cases and 35 deaths from the flu, as seen in Joe Drazan's blog, "Bygone Walla Walla," Union-Bulletin, October 30, 1919. Dr. James F. Cropp, Washington Odd Fellows Home physician, wrote in the Sovereign Grand Lodge Annual Journal as follows:

"Most of the adult members escaped, possibly due to vaccinations which seemed to take more effect on adults than on children. One time there were 41 confined to bed. Some were desperately ill, but fortunately only one death occurred. It is most gratifying to know that we lost only one child during the 21 years I attended the children at the Home."

Thanks to Dr. Cropp's persistent work, 45 orphans and half-orphans survived the nation's worse influenza pandemic in history. It was a happy day when new playground equipment was installed on the Home grounds for the enjoyment of the children.


2020 COVID-19

There are no coronavirus cases at the Odd Fellows Home. All 340 residents are staying in place until further notice. Exceptions are doctor appointments, grocery shopping, banks, and take-out. The 220 staff members prepare meals for four dining rooms, answer requests for maintenance, and organize social distancing in all activities.

On March 10, CEO John Brigham announced proactive guidelines from Governor Jay Inslee. First, group activities were canceled. The Wellness Center was closed. The pool and spa were shut down. There were no visitors to the main buildings until further notice. Brigham asked for everyone's cooperation in keeping vulnerable residents healthy.

WHAT IS IT LIKE TO BE SELF-ISOLATED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE?

Sandy Davin — Nurse Supervisor, East Care Skilled Nursing: "The residents play Bingo by sitting 6 feet apart in the hallway. Staff members call out numbers and deliver prizes. Residents in their rooms are visited by staff with an iPad open to Skype. Residents enjoy having

'face time' with a relative or friend. Some are comfortable doing jigsaw puzzles, reading, or listening to books on tape. The residents eat meals in their rooms instead of in the communal dining room."

"We can't socialize because of 6 feet of separation, but a friend and I walk the halls for a mile five days a week. When it's warm outside, I walk on the sidewalk. I like the dinners delivered by Meals on Wheels. If the meal is too spicy, I appreciate Ruth Farnes and her granddaughter shopping for me."

"I hope that all my Lodge Sisters stay safe during this critical time. I'm looking forward to seeing them on June 2nd."
