Again, these certificates should not be sent to me before your first meeting in February.





A LOOK INTO WALLA WALLA'S PAST



The dining hall on the first floor of the IOOF Home Administration Building had family-style meals with straight-backed wooden chairs and red-checkered tablecloths. Pots and pans were simple stainless steel during WW II when steel was in short supply. Women

wore hats, dresses, and gloves. Shoes were simple Oxfords, pumps, and sandals. Nylon stockings vanished from stores around 1942, and women donated their hosiery to be re-purposed as parachutes and power bags.



During World War II (1941-45), the brick Administration Building (built in 1897) was the center of activity. Food, such as meat, sugar, butter, and canned goods, was rationed. People planted "Victory Gardens" to grow their own fruit and vegetables. At the IOOF Home, produce, poultry, eggs, and dairy were sold at the market.

What wasn't sold was consumed by the residents and staff. The fashion of the day for men was suits, white shirts, suspenders, and fedora hats. Men walked through a covered arcade from the Men's Building to the Administration Building. If you recognize anyone in the pictures, please let Editor Bill Ostlund know.

(Editor's note: About 200 historic Walla Walla photos were given to the Odd Fellows Home in by Joe Drazan in 2006. He is a retired Whitman College archives librarian who collects pictures of the Walla Walla Valley in a blog titled, "Bygone Walla Walla." Shirley Ruble of



Edmond L. Reitan, Jr. honored for his 65 years of service in Washington

Edmond L. Reitan, Jr., Past Grand Master and Past Grand Secretary Emeritus, was honored with a 65 Year Jewel on Monday, January 18 at the Grand Lodge of Washington office in Buckley. His jewel was presented to him by current Grand Master John "Johneo" Otterstrom.

Brother Edmond, known to most folks as "Butch,"



grew up in Kent. In late 1955 he made application to Titusville IOOF Lodge #34 and was elected to membership. He was initiated on January 26, 1956. By the end of March, Butch received all three degrees. He was not able to attend lodge meetings while he was serving on active duty as a Naval Reservist at Sandpoint Naval Air Station in Seattle from December of 1957 to December of 1960.

For the three additional

degrees of Odd Fellowship, Butch joined Kent Encampment #15. He worked his way through the chairs and became a Past Chief Patriarch.

In 1962, Butch joined Canton Mt. Si #36 which was meeting in Snoqualmie at the time. Again, he worked his way through the chairs and became a Captain in 1965

Later in 1962, he joined Adina Rebekah Lodge #27 in Kent. He has maintained continuous membership in these four Units of the Order from the date he joined until today.

Brother Butch found the most satisfaction while working in the Patriarch's Militant as Canton Mt. Si #36 met on the first Friday of the month and regional activities were held on weekends. After getting married, this Branch of the Order was the easiest for him to work his day job with the United States Postal Service and still raise a family.

In the 1980s, Brother Butch was appointed to several terms on the Washington JJYC while his son was active in the Junior Odd Fellows. Since there was only one Junior Lodge in the state — Junior Odd Fellows Lodge #55 in Yakima — Butch drove his son Craig and friend Jason Pries over the Cascade Mountains so they could attend lodge meetings.

After election as Grand Master, he presided over the

1988 Grand Sessions held in Spokane.

In the 1990s, Butch served as Vice President of the Department Council of Washington. In 2003, Brother Butch was awarded the Meritorious Service Jewel.

In August of 2004, he was appointed Grand Secretary and served in that position until November of 2011. During the 2012 Grand Sessions, he was named Secretary Emeritus and was presented with the appropriate jewel.

In 2003, Major General E.L. Reitan was elected Quartermaster of the Department Council of Washington. In the intervening years, the Department was dropped to Regiment level status, then to Battalion level status. He has continued to be elected Quartermaster and continues in that position today.

Brother Butch was Secretary of Titusville IOOF Lodge #34 for 26 years and was Noble Grand for a year. Presently, he is Vice Grand.

He has been Treasurer of Kent Encampment #15 since 2006 and is Clerk of Canton Mt. Si since 2003.

We do not know if you can say Brother Butch works fast — after all, it has taken him 65 year to accomplish the afore mentioned. We believe it is safe to say he is dedicated!

His leading Chief of his Naval Reserve Squadron liked the way Butch always showed up for drills and nicknamed him "Steady Eddy."

Congratulations Butch!



lodges will close and eventually Odd Fellowship will exist in a few dusty museum collections and the old lodge halls that haven't fallen to the wrecking ball. On an overall level, that perception is true. Membership numbers are declining. Members are aging. However, we may be at the beginning of the turnaround that Odd Fellowship has needed.

GOOD NEWS FOR ODD FELLOWSHIP

The current pandemic has presented many challenges to our lodges. Lodges that rely on rentals have had their income go away with the restrictions on gatherings. Members have been cut off from the fellowship that the lodges provide. Charitable projects conducted by lodges have gone undone. Despite that, there is good news for Odd Fellowship: There are places where Odd Fellowship is growing and finding newer, younger members.

In the past year, a handful of new lodges have been chartered around the country. New lodges have been established in New Orleans and Alexandria, Louisiana; Saugerties, New York; Plano, Texas; Hammonton, New Jersey; and Chester, Virginia. Internationally, new lodges have been started in both Brazil and Ghana. There are plans in place to charter new lodges in Helena, Montana; Thermopolis, Wyoming; and LaCrosse, Wisconsin. All of this renewed interest in Odd Fellowship is no coincidence. Increasingly, as civic life becomes more fractured, individualized, and isolated, people are looking for ways to find a sense of community and belonging. Odd Fellowship provides an ideal place to find exactly that.

Younger People Are Interested

In the cases of the new lodges that have been chartered, the common element has all been the same: Younger people were looking for something to belong to and they found their way to the Odd Fellows. We have a unique position in fraternal orders. We're not separated by gender which allows couples to easily join. We're also not specific to any particular ethnicity or religion which means we can bring in a wide cross-section of members of our communities. That kind of wide open accessibility is a big part of the appeal for younger, newer members.

TELEVISION IS HELPING

Another part of the appeal for newer members is our traditions. TV shows like "American Pickers" do a great job of showcasing some of the artifacts from our glory days like our collar regalia and our pictures. Prospective members see those impressive elements of Odd Fellowship and want to be a part of whatever it represents. They don't see wearing traditional collar regalia as

cumbersome; they see it as meaningful. They don't want to skip wearing robes for degree work. They want to be a part of all of the ceremonies with all of the pageantry and regalia. Those are the things that makes Odd Fellowship appear meaningful to them. After all, the average young worker starting his or her career already has enough expedience in his or her life with all the conference calls and online meetings and other ways of accelerating business. They're looking for something different; something slower and with more meaning.

SIGNS ARE VERY IMPORTANT TODAY


The most important part of the growth that has happened in Odd Fellowship has been because lodges or Grand Lodges make themselves available to be contacted by non-members. A lodge that has no signs on its building identifying itself as an Odd Fellows Hall might as well not exist. Sure, the members know how and when to find a meeting, but what about the general public? The days of having the local fraternal order meeting nights listed in the town newspaper are over (as are the days of the town newspaper, for the most part). To participate in the growth that's happening in Odd Fellowship our lodges need to be discoverable.

Do you have a sign on the side of your building that lets people know who you are and what you do? Does it include contact information? Do you have a website? If not, is your contact info on the Grand Lodge website up to date so that the Grand Secretary can direct prospective members to your lodge? Do you have a Facebook page for your lodge? Are you a member of your local Chamber of Commerce? If you still have a town newspaper (or more commonly now, a town blog or Facebook Group) do you send them information about your activities? Unless you make your lodge known to your community it will be incredibly difficult for anyone to apply to join.

MAKE YOUR LODGE EASY TO FIND

Although it is still small, there is a growing desire amongst people, especially younger people, to belong to something bigger and more meaningful than themselves. In many other places, Odd Fellowship has been the destination those people have sought. There's no reason why we can't have that same kind of success here in Washington. As long as you make your lodge known to the general public, people will be able to find you and you can benefit from that growth. We have a wonderful Grand Lodge and a very hard working Grand Secretary who is always willing to help with ideas and assistance to grow membership. Every one of our lodges is precious and important and every one of them can grow when people know how to find them.





all, and to all a good night."






