that your officers took last year is still good until their replacement takes office.


Please, no refreshments per COVID-19 guidelines IF you do have an installation ceremony, social distance and wear masks. This may sound repetitive, but



Rumor has it that an Elf from Buckley will spontaneously visit in Bucoda as well.

BUCODA COMMUNITY CENTER

As promised the cook's tour of the world renowned landmarks in Bucoda continues. This issue features the Bucoda Community Center.

The Odd Fellows originally met in Bucoda's Opera House (yes, we had one). In the 1920s the Odd Fellows Lodge building was constructed, with the Lodge room occupying the upper floor. The Post Office, telephone exchange and two retail spaces were on the lower level.

Flash forward to 2005. The building had, unfortunately, fallen into a state of disrepair. The top floor was completely unusable and only one room was serviceable on the lower level — and even that one leaked.

Enter the Town of Bucoda. A deal was struck where the Town would purchase the building, restore and update it, use it as a Community/Event Center and the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs would continue meeting in the Lodge room. Over several years, with generous donations from prominent local families and grants from the State, the building has been restored to much of its previous glory, including the original wood floor in the lodge room.

Interestingly, during the restoration it was discovered

that this concrete building contained no rebar, in the modern sense. Rather, where small pieces of concrete have eroded away, cables and chains used in logging which were put in to strengthen the walls. Some are visible today.

On July 24, 2010, the building was dedicated as the Bucoda Community Center. The Lodge Hall, dining area and full kitchen are upstairs and the Town Hall and two rental spaces occupy the lower level, one with a small kitchen.

And let's not forget Emory. Who is Emory, you may ask? Emory is the ghost known to haunt the building. Yes, even the old Lodge hall has its spirits. No one knows who Emory might be, nor if that is even his real name, but he has become a fixture in the building. Emory has never been known to manifest in the lower level of the building, preferring to remain upstairs opening doors and, occasionally, moving things around when no one is watching. Mischievous might be an apt description of Emory.
