Help us maintain our newspaper mailing list

TO MEMBERS OF THE ORDER OF THE JURISDICTION OF WASHINGTON

Brothers and Sisters,

I have a couple of things regarding *The Washington OddFellow* newspaper that need to be addressed.

If you have a member who has resigned, taken a with-drawal, is deceased, etc., it's important to let the Grand Lodge Secretary know as soon as possible so the name of the member can be removed from the newspaper mailing list or the newspaper email list.

Sometimes we go years before we find out a member is deceased. The Grand Lodge gets hit with all of the returns from the United States Postal Service (USPS) and it's not cheap. We want to keep the roster up to date as much as possible. If you have members who "snowbird" and do not want to receive *The Washington OddFellow* during the winter months then we need to know when to *not send* the the newspaper and *when to restart*.

Likewise, please check with all of your members to see if they are getting the newspaper. Sometimes a member may not get their *Washington OddFellow* but this is no fault of ours but that of the USPS. In that case, check with the Grand Lodge Secretary to make sure she has your correct mailing address and, if so, then you need to contact your local USPS office.

When you get new members, ask them if they want their

newspaper emailed or a printed copy mailed. Note it on the new member form.

If you have any questions please do not hesitate to contact the Grand Lodge or Rebekah Assembly Secretaries.

L.J. JONES SCHOLARSHIP

In mid October the Grand Lodge office mailed out information on the L.J. Jones Scholarship for 2021. Make sure your Secretary reads the letter and the instruc-

tions and adhere to the deadlines. If your lodge isn't quite meeting yet be sure to call the members and see if they have any students that will be qualified for the scholarship.

WHERE CAN YOU MEET?

Speaking of meetings, if your lodge members feel that they can stay safe, social distance, wear masks and have a place to actually meet, then please do so.

VIDEO CONFERENCING

At the DDGM meeting on October 10, the section on "video conferencing" was hashed out and this is what was agreed to: If your lodge can meet, and a member would like to "video conference" into that meeting, it is acceptable. If you need a member who can't be there in person to make a quorum, they can "video conference" into the meeting. A phone call into a meeting is not acceptable. A member who is "video conferencing" into a meeting has all rights and privileges that they are entitled to as a member of that Unit (voting, discussion, holding office, etc.). All persons in attendance must be in good standing and a member of the degree in which the meeting is open. No degree work can be conferred. Also, your "video conferencing" must be on a secure high-speed network access. You'll find this in the SGL Code of General Laws XLVI-3 Sec. 7. Meetings B. Remote Meeting Access. However, "video conferencing" is not allowable for regular meetings unless all members of your lodge have equal access to the format. Attendance at a meeting in person is a choice. Attendance for a "virtual conference" without access is denying a member their right to choose.

SECRETARY OF STATE

In case you didn't understand what SOS meant in my last newsletter, it stands for Secretary of State. That's the office that issues those little yellow postcard that shows up and costs \$10 to file for corporations. If you aren't sure about this contact the Grand Lodge office.

YEAR END REPORTS

Year end reports will be sent out next month. A reminder to secretaries: even if you have the same officers for this next year you will still need to fill out the new officer forms and Past Grand Certificates, even if the Past Grand has received a certificate last year or many years before. Every year it must be filled out and turned into this office.



LET'S ALL BE THANKFUL


I am asking each of your to take time during this November to make a list of things you are thankful for. You might have one thing or many. May each one of you have a great November and Happy Thanksgiving.

THE STORY OF OUR TREE

Nope not going to say one word about our Encampment in this letter. You all know what you need

to do! I'm just going to tell a story instead.

As I sit under a pine tree 190 miles from home waiting to see what comes out of the tree line, I thought about a tree that sets in my backyard. When Dee and I first bought our place we both looked at the tree and thought that would be a good place for the kids' tire swing. As I looked more, I could see this tree had a half inch log chain holding it together about 20 feet up. It was also evident that it had been on fire at one time, and set about recovering from

it by growing new growth over the burned parts. The split in it starts about three feet up. After the first winter we spent in our new home I trimmed the tree back rather severely as it spread from my shop nearly to the house, some 60 or so feet across the canopy.


No More Trimming

We bought the place in 1980 and since that first trimming I have never trimmed anything except what has fallen off of it or hangs too low to the ground. If I can walk under it that is just fine with me. I made that decision some years ago as it occurred to me that the tree had fought to live and taken a beating from the years before we got there.

I have spent many enjoyable hours sitting on my patio in the early morning watching the birds and bees and squirrels in that tree. On the side closest to my shop there is a split where new growth meets old. About six or seven years ago a swarm of bees moved in and have taken up residence. There must be a lot of honey in there. The bees swarm every spring and kick out the old queen so a new one can take over. My kids and friends who come over get all excited about getting stung by them. I just tell them to be calm and they will not bother you.

BIRDS AND SQUIRRELS GALORE

If you can name a bird that lives in the Northwest it has taken up residence in that tree at some time robins, mourning doves, quail, finches, sparrows and collared doves. This spring a pair of humming birds took up residence and hatched babies. I have spent many enjoyable hours over coffee watching them fly back and forth to the feeder. Last fall I discovered that a pair of squirrels have found a hollow in the top of the tree and decided it was a good place to raise their young. Last week

there were five or six baby squirrels running all over the tree. I did not know they had babies this late in the year.

YEARS OF ENJOYMENT

During one of our summer wind storms this year, the tree lost a major branch which I had to clean up. I really hated to see that. But you know that old tree just keeps on going and has given so much enjoyment and shelter to so many living things that it has earned the right to die of old age. I have no idea how old it was when we bought the place. What I do know is it is the original house on what was a 350 acre farm and the older part of the house was built in the early 1930s, so I suppose the tree is at least 70 or 80 years old.

ODD FELLOWSHIP HAS WEATHERED STORMY TIMES

What does this have to do with Odd Fellowship? Not one dang thing, but if you think about it you may find that like that tree, Odd Fellowship has gone through some stormy times and weathered the changes and problems to keep helping others, much as that old tree has done for so many things.

I will end by wishing you a happy Thanksgiving Day. We may not think we have much to be thankful for given the current situation, but if we think hard, we will find that we have an abundance of things to be thankful for.



IOOF HOME STILL IN PHASE 1

Walla Walla County is in Phase 2 of the recovery process, but nursing homes and assisted living facilities are still considered to be in Phase 1. There is a provision for outdoor family visits in Phase 1. These visits all take place on the Magnolia Patio and are by appointment only.

Here are a few rules for outdoor visits:

- They can be accommodated Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until noon and 1 p.m. until 3 p.m. by appointment only.
- Outdoor visits are limited to 30 minutes and are subject to weather conditions.
- Visitors will be screened for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 prior to the visit.
 - All visits will be supervised by a staff member.
- Masking, social distancing and hand hygiene are mandatory.

JOE'S PLACE WAS ONE OF THE FIRST TO SERVE OLYMPIA BEER

But now, return with me to the year 1898. Bucoda was still 12 years away from being chartered as a town when Joe Farrington opened the Bucoda Tavern. Joe, or "Pa" as he was known, served whiskey and beer; and was also one of the




Joe's Place in Bucoda at night. family for 122 years.

tap continuously since 1903. The Bucoda Tavern was a favorite of the sawmill and mine workers due to its proximity to the mill and mines. One might even consider it to be the original "Cheers"; everybody knew your name. The building was destroyed by fire in 1920 but was soon rebuilt, this time of brick.

Prohibition was enacted in 1920. In 1933, at its repeal, The Bucoda Tavern was still in operation and thriving. Joe "Pa" Farrington died behind the bar in 1937 and the establishment was renamed Joe's Place in his honor. The line of succession in ownership is a bit muddled, but what is known is that Joe's Place has been owned by a single


