
#### **Dress Code** FOR SESSIONS



the westside as well. I have spent the last few days suffering from allergies due to everything in bloom over here. So, if you wonder why I wrote that, I will tell you.

Grand Encampment this year will be a declared fragrance-free zone. What that means is do not come wearing all of your perfume, cologne, aftershave, and "makes me smell good to me" stuff. I know some of you will be offended by that so I will explain.

I have spent most of this week in allergy distress, plugged up nose, running and coughing, which causes a lot of time lying down trying to breath. Over 50 years in the construction industry I have become highly sensitized to certain types of chemicals due to exposure from working in some very nasty places, such as shutdowns in aluminum plants, phosphorus plants, pulp mills and constant exposure to welding fumes among other things.

I will give you a vivid example of one job. Working for a large crane

company here locally, we were working in a shop building a large crane for the Lampson Corporation. There were 13 of us welding large bore dual shield wire on the back shift. With that type of welding process, the doors to the shop were always kept closed so wind would not blow the shielding gas from our welds resulting in substandard welds that would need to be cut out and replaced. The air exchange system in that building would fully exchange the total volume of air in the building every 13 minutes. With that many of us welding it could not keep up, so we were always in a cloud of welding fumes. The exhaust smoke was so bad that the fire department showed up one night to see if the building was on fire. Seems the office forgot to tell them we were working at night.

So please leave that stuff at home. I think you all smell just fine.



### Take advantage of the pandemic

## Prepare now for future growth

The pandemic has now been a part of our daily lives for more than a year. There is almost no area of life it has not disrupted. As much of a challenge as that disruption can be, it can also present us with opportunities. Just as restaurants have found new ways of serving patrons and retailers have created new ways of getting their goods to those who need them, our Odd Fellow and Rebekah Lodges can use this crisis as an opportunity for growth.

#### PEOPLE ARE LOOKING TO CONNECT

One of the hallmarks of the pandemic has been isolation. While it may have been necessary to help slow the spread of the virus, it had some major social consequences as more and more people have felt increasingly lonely and isolated. More people than ever are searching for ways that they can connect with others and do something meaningful with a group of people. We, as Odd Fellows and Rebekahs, have exactly what they're looking for. We have a history of caring for one another in our times of need and a legacy of bringing people together in our communities that goes back more than

two centuries.

#### LET'S NOT BE INVISIBLE

The biggest question is how we can let people in our communities know that our Odd Fellow and Rebekah Lodges are the places to find what they're looking for. Most people are so unaware of fraternalism in general (and Odd Fellowship specifically) that we are almost completely invisible. To be able to take advantage of the current desire for meaningful group activities we need to communicate with our communities and let them know how to find our lodges.

Our Grand Patriarch wrote an excellent article recently in which he talked about cleaning our halls and making them look presentable. I would love to see each lodge put his words into practice and ensure that each building becomes a bright, inviting beacon of Odd Fellowship. Entrances should be clean and well-marked. Signs should have accurate information about the meeting time and day. Contact information for the lodge Secretary and/or Noble Grand should be posted somewhere that people can see it and copy it down so they can make

contact to join. If your lodge doesn't have the manpower to accomplish some of these tasks, you can do some networking in the community and find other volunteers who might be willing to help out. That's another excellent opportunity for membership. All it takes is one person to ask the question "Who are the Odd Fellows?" to potentially gain a dedicated new member.

#### CONNECT WITH YOUR LOCAL NEWSPAPER

Sharing the story of your lodge with local media is also an excellent way to let members of the community know that your lodge is available for them to join. With recent reductions in newspaper staffing, most newspapers, especially in small communities, are happy to print stories sent to them. Any occasion can be a reason to send a story to the local newspaper: new flooring in the lodge kitchen, installations of officers, even membership anniversaries of long-time members. Even if nothing important is happening currently, stories can be written about the history of a lodge such as prominent former members (mayors, police chiefs, school principals, bank presidents, etc.) or important historical milestones. Did your lodge host the first dances in town? The first church? The first courts? Be creative and find ways to share your lodge's story with your community.

#### START A FACEBOOK PAGE

Social media is another way to let the community know that your lodge is open to new members. Many of us now are familiar with Facebook. Start a Facebook page for your lodge where you post about what has happened recently or upcoming events at your lodge. If there are Facebook groups for your local city or area, be sure and post to those groups about the lodge and what you're doing. Let the members of those other community-based Facebook groups know that your lodge exists and will welcome involvement from new members. Write about how much you enjoy participating in your lodge and why. Share the message of Odd Fellowship with those around you.

#### OLD FASHIONED NETWORKING

Networking in the community is a tried-and-true method to bring people into your lodge. If you have a lodge with financial resources, contact other charity groups in your area and let them know you would be willing to partner with them by providing some funding for a joint project. If you have a hall, find groups in the community that need space for events like theater companies, music schools, science clubs, gaming clubs, knitting circles, craft clubs, etc. Make contact with them and let them know that you have a space they could rent. It only takes one person asking the question, "Who are the Odd Fellows?" to give you the opportunity to tell our story.

#### **COMMUNITY NETWORKING**


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#### YOUNG PROFESSIONALS ARE LOOKING

## Past Grand Matriarch Valma DeVall dies at 93

She went through the chairs in the Grand Ladies Encampment Auxiliary and became Grand Matriarch for the 1986-87 Session which was held in Tacoma. In 1989 Valma was elected Grand Scribe and served in that office 11 years until 2000. She was then granted the title of Scribe Emeritus.

Because of a number of consolidations, her lodge and LEA affiliations changed several times. At the time of her death she was a member of Alder Rebekah Lodge #80 in Bickleton and Washington State LEA #100.

Her husband, Paul, died in 2002. She is survived by 4 children, 14 grand children, 25 great-grandchildren and 5 great-great grandchildren. A celebration of her life will be held at a later date. She will be missed.

daughters. His Mother was an excellent nurse. The three girls are nurses, graduates of Walla Walla University. One lives in New Jersey and two live in Walla Walla. "They're all smarter than I am," Malcolm said. "I was a

tool and die maker as well as being a mechanic."

Malcolm is just barely 80 years old. He met his wife Margaret at a Billy Graham campaign in Bible School in Toronto, Ontario, Canada. Malcolm was a lay preacher for a non-denominational, evangelical church. He knew Evangelist Billy Graham, and his favorite gospel singer was George Beverly Shea. Malcolm likes to tell the story about how he met Margaret.

He was walking past a dumpster when he smelled hot metal that shouldn't have been there. Being curious, he went through the trash and found a kettle with a hole burned in it. "As a tool and die man, I saw someone had let the kettle go dry and made a hole in it," Malcolm said. "Then somebody started hitting me on the shoulder and the back. It was my future wife. She didn't like me finding that burnt-out kettle."

Malcolm and Margaret were married 38 years ago in Walla Walla. They drove up the Alcan Highway to Fairbanks twice in a Chevrolet. The road was a "wash-board," and Malcolm stopped many times to repair the car. He and Margaret also traveled from Alaska to Maine twice in Chevrolets. Margaret passed away in Walla Walla three-and-a-half years ago.

Malcolm and Margaret had four sons.

The oldest son, Randy, lives in town. He and his wife have a dozen children, and he rehabs houses for a higher price. They live in an apartment building Randy has refurbished. He stands at 6-foot, 5-inches, a powerhouse of a builder. When the family plays baseball, Malcolm said, everyone wants Randy on their team because he almost always hits home runs.

Another son enjoys working with Randy, improving fixer-uppers, buying materials, refurbishing kitchens and bathrooms.

A third son, John Hallowell, is a historian and author of a book on the history of the Senegal Indian Chiefs on the southern coast of New Jersey. He also wrote about the little towns on the west side of New Jersey from 1920 to the present.

John lives off the coast of Florida and writes a column in the *Highland Lakes Weekly*, which he sends to Malcolm. "John has always been a writer," Malcolm said. "Growing up, he used to write the family history and send it to us every week."

The youngest son manages a body shop for automobiles in New Jersey. He and his wife were both in the Marines Corps. She was an excellent sharpshooter. They were deployed to battle in the South Sea Islands. Enemy ships lined up to attack the Marines and re-take the island. At the signal, the markswoman opened fire on the enemy's commanding officers. As the leaders fell, the enemy ships weighed anchor and got underway.

The couple returned home on furlough. President Dwight D. Eisenhower invited Malcom's son and wife to come to Washington, D.C. where she received a medal and a promotion to Officer. Eisenhower offered them a private ride in Marine One, the President's helicopter. Malcolm said, "All this inspired my son to work on improving his aim."

For a time, Malcolm worked for the U.S. Government in the Navy as a mechanic and tool and die operator. Then he worked for the Canadian Government overhauling the only aircraft carrier they had. We wanted to show them we could manage the ship's

controls and make sure everything worked," Malcolm said.

As a mechanic, Malcolm knows all about antique cars, and he enjoys seeing their photos in *The Washington OddFellow*. But he doesn't want to enter every "Guess the Car" contest. "One win is enough for me," he said. "Let the others have a chance to be winners, too.

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### Following open heart surgery

## Your Editor is finally back to work

Yes, your editor of *The Washington OddFellow* is back — sort of. A couple of months ago, I suffered what the medical pros called a "massive myocardial infarction." In other words, a heart attack. I called 911 from home (at

the insistence of Grand Secretary Laurel Delony) and was transported to Good Samaritan Hospital in Puyallup via ambulance. Late that night, I was loaded in another ambulance and taken to Tacoma General Hospital.

After a series of tests (MRI, X-rays, and who knows what else), it was determined that I had 70 per cent blockage of the main artery in my heart. The surgeon said I needed either a stent or open heart bypass

I signed the releases and the next morning I was next thing I was aware of was waking up in ICU with

all kinds of paraphernalia plugged into me. They had cut my chest open from just below my adam's apple to just north of my belly button.

I spent the next four or five days fighting pain, nausea and extreme weakness — not a fun experience.

I was then transferred to the rehab facility in Hell. I told them the first morning I wanted out, but to no avail. I finally checked myself out on the third day. I was never so happy to see Laurel's Jeep outside. Laurel and her mom got me home and into my own bed.

I had arranged for home care (two people who live very close to me) and they are still preparing my meals, helping me when I need it, etc.

#### A DIFFERENT LOOK

As you probably noticed, The Washington OddFellow looked somewhat different the past two months. Laurel, bless here soul, took on the job of putting the newspaper together. Since a number of stories for the March edition were under lock and key in my computer, she did not have access to them. I am so proud of Laurel for the fine job she did! That would be like me stepping in as Grand Secretary without any training. This month the newspaper is pretty much back to normal except for being a little late.

Special thanks to Laurel, Museum Curator Lisa Sweeney, Grand Lodge staffer Melissa Hildner, and Queen Mother Joanne Balmert. They helped me with everything from showers to driving me back and forth from work.

And thank you all for your kind words of encouragement and your prayers.
